


### **Synopsis**

Meanwhile, you will witness how the good harmony between Japanese and Spanish broke apart bloodily into a thousands pieces, and how that blood was used as ink to write a warning message addressed to king Philip IV. This is not only a historical chronology but an adventures tale that tries to show us that we share a past with a land that continues to surprise us even nowadays
